

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WELCOME FROM THE DIRECTOR

OUR HISTORY

he Mongan Institute was named in honor of Dr. James J. and Jean H. Mongan. Dr. Mongan was President and CEO of Partners HealthCare from 2003–2009, President of MGH from 1996–2002, and a professor of health care policy and social medicine at Harvard Medical School. Earlier in his career, Dr. Mongan spent 11 years in Washington, DC, where he worked on Medicare and Medicaid legislation as a staff member of the Senate Committee on Finance, served in the Carter administration as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Health, and worked at the White House as associate director of the domestic policy staff. He served on the board of trustees of the American Hospital Association and the Kaiser Family Foundation and was a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences. Dr. Mongan passed away on May 3, 2011.

FOUNDATION FOR THE "NEW" MONGAN INSTITUTE

The Mongan Institute of today consists of an array of centers that originated in 2016, but the origins of the Institute at MGH began over two decades ago. In 1998, Dr. David Blumenthal founded The Mongan Institute for Health Policy as a singular research center dedicated to the study and advancement of health policy. This foundational research initiative was co-sponsored by MGH and Partners HealthCare with the goal of conducting health policy research aimed at improving the quality and efficiency of health care locally and nationally.

Vision for the Future of Health Care and Population Science at MGH

As with all transformative initiatives, an early vision for the next phase of the Mongan Institute was essential for future success. We are collectively indebted to Dr. Katrina Armstrong for her vision and leadership that laid the groundwork for the Mongan Institute. Under Dr. Armstrong's charge, an expert panel was convened in 2015 to conduct an evaluation and make recommendations for the future of health care and population science at MGH. These recommendations resulted in a vision for the "new" Mongan Institute by aggregating a constellation of centers supported by the Department of Medicine and MGH. Many of the centers that were formerly dispersed across MGH are now co-located in a wonderful workspace and environment on the 15th and 16th floors of 100 Cambridge Street. Among the sources of support for the Mongan Institute are several endowed chairs, including the James J. and Jean H. Mongan Endowed Chair of Health Policy and Community Health. I am deeply honored to be the inaugural occupant of the Mongan Endowed Chair, given the extraordinary accomplishments of Dr. Mongan.






MONGAN INSTITUTE CENTERS

NEW RESEARCH COMPONENTS LAUNCHED BY SENIOR LEADERSHIP

Dr. Jennifer Haas

We are extraordinarily fortunate to have Dr. Haas join us in the fall of 2018 as Director of Research and Training for the Division of General Internal Medicine (DGIM). Dr. Haas is an internationally recognized leading researcher on disparities in health care and risk assessment and prevention with an extraordinary commitment to research training and mentoring in primary care. Dr. Haas launched the new Center for Primary Care Research at the Mongan Institute this fall.

Dr. Christine Ritchie

We are thrilled to have recruited Dr. Ritchie, an international leader in aging and palliative care research, from UCSF to join MGH in September 2019. Dr. Ritchie will develop and direct the new Center for Aging and Serious Illness Research at the Mongan Institute, which will respond to the clinical and research priorities of an aging population, including those with complex health conditions and serious illness and those in need of palliative care.

Dr. Andrea Foulkes

Joining MGH in September 2019 as Director of Biostatistics for the Division of Clinical Research, Dr. Foulkes will have her primary academic appointment at the Mongan Institute as Director of the **Biostatistics and Data Science Unit**. Dr. Foulkes will assist in planning and developing data science and biostatistics within Mongan.

LEADERSHIP TRANSITIONS ADVANCING MONGAN PRIORITIES

Joseph Betancourt, MD, MPH

He will continue to be a senior faculty member at the Mongan Institute and senior advisor within the Disparities Solutions Center.

Aswita Tan-McGrory, MBA, MSPH

Previously the deputy director for the Disparities Solutions Center, Ms. Tan-McGrory was appointed Administrative Director for the Mongan Institute, and Director of the Disparities Solutions Center.

Andrew Chan, MD, MPH

Dr. Chan was appointed to Director of Epidemiology for the MGH Cancer Center. He will continue as Director of the Clinical and Translational Epidemiology Unit at the Mongan Institute.

MONGAN WORKGROUPS: IDENTIFYING FUTURE PRIORITIES

Over the spring, six time-limited workgroups with representation across all Mongan centers and programs were initiated to identify priorities for development at Mongan. Reports and recommendations were finalized in the summer and early fall and constitute a blueprint for future development of Mongan. RESEARCH EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Research Trainees and Fellows

Developing the next generation of population and health care delivery scientists is a major priority of the Mongan Institute. Mongan provides mentored research training experiences to over 28 pre-doctoral, post-doctoral, and clinical research fellows. In addition, Mongan Institute faculty provide mentored research training experiences to numerous residents, medical students, and clinical professions students.

SEMINARS

There are more than 12 seminars/meetings within individual centers/programs that provide extraordinary opportunities for all of us to learn and exchange ideas. We are currently developing an itinerary of these center-specific seminars that will provide an overview of all the research training we are doing. In addition to these seminars, we have added three new Mongan-wide seminars to our two established and longstanding Works in Progress and Mock Grant Review events.

New Mongan-Wide Seminars

Research Training Seminar: NextGen

Launched last December, this new seminar focuses on assisting junior faculty early career investigators in a group format and on presenting formative and developing work with the goal of achieving a K (research career development award), research project grants (R21, R32, R01), and related grants. Participants are encouraged to conduct "dry-runs" for feedback on presentations at large research meetings. Due to the popularity of this seminar, there are two different concurrent groups. The NextGen faculty include Josh Metlay, Jennifer Haas, Ken Freedberg, Andrea Ciaranello, Ingrid Bassett, and Steve Bartels.

RESEARCH METHODS INNOVATOR SERIES

In the fall we launched the Research Methods Innovator Series. Ida Sim, MD, PhD presented our first seminar, "Health Information Technology Big Data, And Medicine Base Evidence." Brian Mittman, PhD, presented "Evaluating Complex Health Interventions: Embracing and Guiding (Versus Ignoring and Suppressing) Heterogeneity and Adaptation." This successful pilot will continue as a series in the spring, in which we will invite experts to present a provocative perspective on new methods

for 50 minutes, followed by a 30-minute lively discussion on implications and applications.

MGH-Wide Health Policy Grand Rounds

Led by Karen Donelan and sponsored by the Mongan Institute's Health Policy Research Center, this monthly event occurs on the main MGH campus and has been extremely well attended. This offering provides an MGH-wide opportunity to hear from leading individuals in health policy. Speakers and topics over the past year include:

Mock Grant Review



ANNUAL HADDAD AND BLUMENTHAL LECTURES

Every year, the Mongan Institute supports two special grand round Honorary Lectures: the Haddad Lecture and the David Blumenthal Lecture. This past year, we were fortunate to have Wellesley College President Paula A. Johnson, MD, MPH, as the Dr. David Blumenthal Lecturer: "On the Basis of Sex: Making Health Systems Work for Women."

The Haddad Lecture was given by **David Hemenway**, **PhD**, from the Harvard School of
Public Health, an economist who has done leading
work in addressing the issue of gun violence.



RESEARCH DAYS CELEBRATING WORK BY MONGAN INSTITUTE INVESTIGATORS

On October 4, 2018, the Mongan Institute was represented at MGH Clinical Research Day with over 24 poster presentations, including several award-winning posters by Mongan investigators.

On October 5, 2018, the Mongan Institute co-sponsored the Third Annual Community Research Day Celebration at the MGH Chelsea HealthCare Center, with 37 abstract submissions from almost 150 authors, including Mongan investigators who spanned thematic research areas such as: youth/adolescent health; mental health and neuroscience; clinical innovation; health improvement; and population health.

On June 10, 2019, the Mongan Institute cosponsored the **Partners HealthCare Population Health Symposium** research day with over 50 presentations and posters.

On September 25, 2019, we had our first annual Mongan Poster Session at 100 Cambridge Street. This event highlighted posters by early career investigators at Mongan, providing an opportunity to become familiar with work across all of the centers and displaying an exciting array of methods and topics.

In October 2019, the Mongan Institute cosponsored the Fourth Annual Community Research Day Celebration at the MGH Chelsea HealthCare Center, which included a keynote on equity-based population and health care delivery science and an overview of the Mongan Institute.

FUNDING & PUBLICATIONS

GRANT FUNDING

In fiscal year 2019, Mongan faculty principal investigators are responsible for a total of **approximately \$85 million** in MGH grant funding (including Direct and Indirect).

In 2018, four Mongan Institute faculty were among the top **25 highest funded researchers at MGH**: Dr. Carlos Camargo; Dr. Elyse Park; Dr. Ken Freedberg; and Dr. Jennifer Temel.

PUBLICATIONS

Mongan faculty published 845 articles in the 2018–2019 academic year (September 1, 2018–August 31, 2019). The word clouds on the next page, derived from keywords in these publications, illustrates topics and linkages between topics, as well as methods across publications.









PARTNERSHIP INITIATIVES

HARVARD-WIDE IMPLEMENTATION SCIENCE INTEREST GROUP

Partnering with leaders and implementation science researchers at the Harvard School of Public Health and Brigham and Women's Hospital, the Mongan Institute has helped co-sponsor a Harvard-wide monthly meeting/ seminar focused on developing implementation science capability and methods across Harvard. In the fall, we hosted a seminar at the Mongan that addressed adaptation for health equity in implementation science.

PARTNERS POPULATION HEALTH RESEARCH AND EVALUATION

The Mongan Institute has been fortunate to be substantively involved in advancing research and evaluation in population health, including the team of analysts led by Christine Vogeli in conjunction with Mongan faculty. We are currently exploring ways to further enhance initiatives in research and evaluation with the goal of providing rapid findings and supporting access to data and academic research opportunities.


GLOBAL HEALTH

aving laid the foundation for the new Mongan Institute over this past academic year, our next steps will include prioritizing and acting on the recommendations of the six strategic planning workgroups. These workgroups consisted of members from across all Mongan centers and developed specific recommendations for: (1) analytic capacity and data management; (2) research education and training; (3) pre- and post-award management and compliance; (4) space and workplace culture; (5) communications; and (6) membership, diversity, and team science. In addition, we will further develop our partnership initiatives, as well as launch new academic offerings. Priority areas include developing our data science analytic unit, developing an implementation research and training program, and advancing initiatives in learning health systems.





MONGAN INSTITUTE RETREAT

On November 8, 2019, we had our first annual Mongan-wide retreat. The theme was promoting translational team science across Mongan Institute centers. This retreat resulted in additional recommendations from our faculty around the design, implementation, and promotion of developing projects and programs that span multiple centers and leverage the extraordinary potential of the Mongan Institute. We look forward to another productive and exciting year pursuing our mission to "achieve health equity and improve the lives of people with complex health needs through research and training in population and healthcare delivery team science."
